

Promoting British Values at Mount Hawke Academy



The DfE have recently reinforced the need "to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

The Government set out its definition of British values in the 2011 Prevent Strategy. These values were reiterated in 2014 and we are continuing this.

The British values are:-

- Democracy
- The Rule of Law
- Individual Liberty
- Mutual Respect
- Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs

At Mount Hawke Academy, these values are reinforced regularly.

This document gives a brief overview of how British values are celebrated at Mount Hawke Academy through the curriculum we deliver and the wider democratic approach we adopt towards 'Pupil Voice' through the School Council and School Parliament.

The local police officer / PCSO visit the school to talk to the children and explain about their role in society. Children are taught about the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others. We run a Super Six award scheme, where Year 6 children who follow the Super Six Code of Conduct are awarded extra privileges.

through our Religious Education scheme of work. Children learn about different religions, beliefs, places of worship and festivals.

- This is supplemented by assemblies which also mark and celebrate significant religious festivals such as Ramadan, Diwali, Christmas, Chinese New Year.
- Visits are made by local religious leaders and children have the opportunity to visit places of worship.
- Children are taught about the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others.
