SCAVERGER SCIENCE

TRY THIS INDOORS ... Make a shelter

Collect some different materials together from indoors (e.g. foil, card, plastic, cotton) and/or outdoors (e.g. sticks, leaves). Use the materials to make a waterproof mini shelter for a toy. You could start by making a framework like the one in the picture and then put different materials over it. Once the shelter is finished, put a small toy inside and spray or drip water over the top. Try changing the material to find out which one is best at keeping the toy dry.

You will need

- * Collection of materials (e.g. foil, plastic, card, cotton, leaves)
- * Jug of water
- * Small toy
- * Egg box or other small container
- * Paper and glue

WHAT DO YOU NOTICE?

Things to talk about ...

Which materials are best at keeping the toy dry? Why do you think this is? Which materials let the water through? Do they let the water through straight away or after a bit of time? Which materials soak up the water?

NB If you are doing this indoors, put a tray or plastic sheet under the shelter to stop water going on the floor!




WHAT IS THE SCIENCE?

Water cannot pass through **waterproof** materials. Foil and plastic are waterproof which is why they are so useful for wrapping food, and why we make raincoats from plastic materials. Some materials might **absorb** water and so might not let it through straight away, e.g. thick cotton, but after some time, the water will drip through.


Recommended Read

This week's recommendation comes from Truro Class... we recommend *The Valley of Lost Secrets* by Lesley Parr.



We have read it together in class and loved the suspense created from the start. When 12-year-old Jimmy and his little brother are evacuated from London to a small town in South Wales, they try to adjust to a new, quiet life in the valleys away from their dad. Then Jimmy discovers a skull hidden in a tree and wants to find out what happened.

It explores themes of trust, friendship, and the contrast between city and rural life during the war. It makes you intrigued to know what has happened and you can't help but love the main characters.

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Traffic Consultation – Area Speed Limits

Cornwall Council is planning to introduce a 20mph speed limit on most residential streets within the St Agnes & Perranporth Community Network Area.

Why?

Introducing a 20mph speed limit in these areas will make our streets safer, especially for pedestrians, cyclists, and other vulnerable road users. This change supports Cornwall Council's Vision Zero goal: working towards eliminating all fatal and serious injuries on our roads.
